COASTAL WATTLE WORKING BEE - 26 November 2022

We all know that 4wd clubs throughout the length and breadth of NZ do good work for their communities. Whether it's fund-raising for a worthy cause, planting, rubbish clearing, pest eradication, hosting people who can't get to less-accessible places, a great number of our members volunteer their time and effort, also cost of fuel and supplies.

This is where we are all putting something back into the communities where we are active, and it is seen by the wider community including local councils and DOC.

Some of these exercises are publicised, many are not. It would be great if clubs can contribute more articles about what they've done.

A recent example was the working bee on Saturday 26 November, where members of the Twin City 4wd Club in Hawkes Bay joined CCVC Wellington members at Foxton Beach to do a lot of hard work clearing Coastal Wattle, which is a pest that has been overtaking huge areas of dunes in the area, including blocking 4wd trails, and elsewhere around the country. More about Coastal Wattle in a later publication.

Horowhenua District Council were part of the effort, providing the BBQ and other welcome supplies. Three key conservation people from the local community joined in too, it was disappointing that more didn't turn up from the community.

The morning started with two of our vehicles, the mighty FJ40s, which were allowed to access the site. This had looked to be quite challenging. What was worse, it was right next to a residential street. A neighbour (who it turned out, used to be in motorsport) kindly allowed us to go across his lawn, which made for an easier starting point. Much to the amazement of all the neighbours watching, both trucks easily got to the site, ready for hours of winching out trees and scrub that we felled.

Following the safety briefing, the team picked up several bags-full of rubbish, then trudged up the hill and got into the job. It was hard work! We cleared a large part of the outbreak, while there is still lots more to be done at a later date.

Following the morning of hard yakka, then the BBQ, off we went for a trip on the McKenzie Trail. After all, it's only fair to provide reward for hard work!

However: The McKenzie Trail is still significantly flooded, so we were only able to access some parts of it. Even so, there was some great 4wd experience with the odd bit of challenge thrown in.

ORONGORONGO TRIP - 20 November 2022

I was looking forward to this trip as I had not been round the coast in 2022. Like many people I had been too slow to book and kept missing out. But this time Shaun had a spot available for me and I was rapt. Each day the forecast was looking better for Sunday and finally the day arrived, warm but with threatening cloud.

We had a roughly 50:50 mix of members and visitors in everything from a sparkling white LWB Jeep Wrangler to a double-cab Crumpie-style Hilux with the usual helping of Toyota Landcruisers and more recent double-cab utes. Of course there was also a new Suzuki Jimny, there's always at least one nowadays.

We headed off on the usual route - avoid the stoat-traps, round the pole and up the hill to the airstrip. The first climb after the airstrip was slippery and the culvert at the top was wider and muddier than I remember. I was running tail, so the soft bits were quite cut up after 20-odd trucks. The downhill bits had good traction and I was keen on a cuppa under what was now a very grey sky. Shaun announced he'd arrived at the morning tea stop down on the riverbank.

Unfortunately half-way round the very last tight downhill left-hander my truck made a very strange noise from the front right wheel and shuddered to a stop. I hopped out for a look and noticed the tyre was jammed up under the wheel arch and pointing straight ahead. That's funny I thought, as I'd been on hard left lock. Lots of things raced through my mind - maybe the steering's broken, maybe the spring's collapsed, how will I get it out of here. I noticed the left front wheel was also pointing straight ahead so mentally ruled out steering failure. I had another look underneath and couldn't see anything out of place. I called up Shaun to get his expert opinion rather than trust my own limited knowledge. Soon enough the 80 appeared with the cavalry. After taking the obligatory photos Shaun agreed nothing obvious was wrong and we decided it was just a matter of exceeding the flex limit on the old girl. The simple remedy was reversing out. Thankfully this did the trick and I continued on. I later found the offending right front wheel had made contact with a corner of my non-standard battery box that was required by my wider Commodore radiator.

Down on the riverbed we snaked our way across the smaller trickles to the main flow hard against the eastern bank. Up close it looked deeper, faster and murkier than we had hoped. Our concern was that the only crossing point could have a deep spot in it, and would be a daunting challenge for visitors/ newbies. For this reason Shaun thought a better idea was to return back over the hill, and we all agreed. This would be my first time in reverse, so quite exciting.

The return trip was largely uneventful with good grip, only the final downhill onto the airstrip being muddied and slippery.

Between my problem and having to backtrack it was now after midday so we cruised around to the play area for lunch. The rain that had been threatening when we were on the riverbed had gone away and it was now quite warm. The two loose gravel climbs proved they still had what it took to test out vehicles. Some made it look easy (those with lockers/traction control), some made it with a bit of drama and noise (Chris) and some had a couple of goes without success. All good fun.

We meandered our way back around the coastline to air up. One paddock from home our Hilux group spotted an old rutted piece of track full of water and the temptation was just too much. With muddy water above the axles and very little grip the boys needed a quick pull out, with Shaun sporting a very unimpressed look.

Back to the final paddock and aired up, I was chatting with Denise when a member of the public drove through the gate. Shaun stopped him, and explained this was a private area. The gentleman was keen to collect his nephews and they were along the beach. Shaun stood his ground but offered that one of us (me) would drive him down if he parked outside. He, like me, had gone out to party, but he decided to drink and drive and now I have to die.

Why do people do this, mom, knowing it's going to ruin lives?.

Pain is cutting me like a hundred sharp knives. Tell my sister don't be scared mama. Tell daddy to be strong. I love you so much I wish you would give me one last kiss. Someone should have told that kid that it's wrong to drink and drive..

Maybe if his parents had told him I would be alive by now. My breathing is getting weak, mom, and I'm so scared... These are my last moments and I feel so desperate... I wish you could hug me mom while I'm laying here dying.

I wish I could tell you I love you, mom.. I can't feel my body, I can't anymore, mama I love you.. Good bye... "".

TRIP CATEGORIES

Cross Country Vehicle Club Wellington Incorporated (CCVC or Club) organises and runs 4WD trips and events that cover terrain of various degrees of difficulty. Club members and visitors that participate have differing levels of off-road driving skills and experience and their vehicles have differing degrees of off-road capability.

As a guide to participants, the level of difficulty of each trip is identified in advance as falling into one or more of the pre-defined Trip Categories. The Trip Categories are defined as:

Touring Class Travelling on back country roads accessible to the General Public. Limited "off road" travel may occur but only where appropriate to vehicles on the trip;

Family Shiny Introductory level "off road" trip;

Shiny 4x4 More challenging "off road" trip;

Club 4x4 Specialist vehicles and equipment required, also additional driver skills;

Hard Yakka The most difficult terrain, requiring significant driver and vehicle capability.

Safety issues can arise if drivers have inappropriate skills, experience or vehicle capability for any given trip.

CCVC has defined the guidelines set out in this document, describing driver skills and experience prerequisites for participation in club trips and events in order to optimise safety to the greatest extent possible and practicable.

Membership of CCVC

To become a member of CCVC a driver must attend three (3) trips of either the "Touring Class" or "Family Shiny" category trip.

Once these trips have been completed and the "Application for Membership" submitted, the prospective new member's application will be considered through the Club's new member approval process.

Advancing through the trip categories

In order to advance to a "harder" trip category, members are expected to have participated in a minimum of two (2) trips in the previous category. Members are to advise the Trip Leader when they attend their first trip of the next category up.

Members will be required to have attended a club training event, as determined by the Club from time to time, prior to being able to participate in any trip with a category of "Shiny 4x4" or above.

The member must also be judged as being capable to participate in this level of trip by the Trip Leader.

A Trip Leader has the absolute right to exclude a member from a trip if the they believe that the trip is beyond the capability of either the member and/or their vehicle and that participation in the trip has the potential to place the member, their vehicle or other persons participating in the trip in any form of danger due to the Member and/or their vehicles unsuitability.

The Trip Leaders decision on the day is final and can only be contested via the clubs "Complaints Process" as set out in item 51 of the Clubs Rules (Constitution).

To participate in any trip other than "Touring Class" members vehicles must have a current CCVC Vehicle inspection sticker.

Note: Exemption to the Inspection Sticker rule above may be given for trips where the nature of the trip involves minimal or no off road driving and a CCVC certified vehicle is not really required in order to participate in the trip (e.g. Trips/events that have been given a "Shiny 4x4" category in order to exclude non members).

TRAINING:

Training takes place on every trip and Trip Leaders will try to provide support and instruction (as appropriate) to prospective and new members attending each trip.

This may be done either by the trip leader or by having an experienced Club Member take the individual "under their wing" (so to speak) for the period of the trip.

Training events for specific aspects of 4WD'ing will be organised by the Club from time to time.

As from the effective date of this document, attendance at a Club driver training event will no longer be a prerequisite to joining the club.

Members will be required to have attended a Club training event, as determined by the Club from time to time, prior to being able to participate in any trip with a category of "Shiny 4x4" or above.

VEHICLE INSPECTIONS

Safety is paramount in everything the club does and to this end the Club has a vehicle inspection regime where members vehicles are inspected by appointed CCVC Vehicle Inspectors to ensure that the vehicles meet the specific requirements as set out in the various Club documents (e.g. CCVC-SAFETY-0002 Minimum Standards for Tow Hook Mounting).

A vehicle inspection sticker is valid for two (2) years from the date of issue. CCVC requires that all CCVC Members vehicles participating in any trip category other than Touring Class trips have a current CCVC Vehicle Inspection sticker. Members vehicles not having a current sticker displayed cannot participate in trips/events.

The Trip Leader/Event Organiser has no discretion in this regard except: Exemption to the Inspection Sticker rule above may be given for trips where the nature of the trip involves minimal or no off road driving and a CCVC certified vehicle is not really required in order to participate in the trip (e.g. Trips/events that have been given a "Shiny 4x4" category in order to exclude non members).

As from the effective date of this document, having a vehicle inspected and obtaining a vehicle inspection sticker for the vehicle will no longer be a prerequisite to joining the Club. Members and prospective members can judge for themselves which trips are appropriate for them however the Trip Leader has the final say as to whether a person or vehicle can participate in any trip or event.

It is recommended that novices on Family Shiny trips and Members new to the Shiny 4x4 category make themselves known to the Trip Leader so they can be allocated a "buddy" to guide and assist them during the trip.
