BOULDER BASH 2023

The NZFWDA 2023 AGM was scheduled to take place in Methven on 21 May 2023. The Mid Canterbury 4WD Club were hosting and had decided to put on a series of 4WD trips in the week leading up to the AGM. Over 50 truck were signed up to attend, including 6 trucks from CCVC. We were joined by Ian Hutchings, Euan Howden, Darren Pettengell, David Sole and Howard Symes (2 Toyotas, 2 Nissans and 2 Land Rovers). We were divided into 2 groups, which tackled each route on alternate days. We left Methven at 8am each morning returning at sunset, having completed about 200km each day, with more than 35km off road. The trip leaders had set a hard turn-around time of 2pm irrespective of where we were. This would ensure that we still had plenty of daylight left to exit the river bed and make our way back to town in time for dinner. Several participants met at the nominated local restaurant for dinner each evening.

Havelock River – Mistake Flat Hut (38km)

Group 1 did this trip on Monday and Group 2 on Tuesday

We head south-west on SH72 and across the Rangitata River, turning north on Rangitata Gorge Road travelling past the Peel Forest to Mesopotamia Station where we aired down before entering the river bed. Howard's Prado decided it didn't want to engage low range just before the first deep water crossing. The trip mechanic had a look at the vehicle and a decision was made to abandong the vehicle and sort it out on the way home. Howard and Joy were given seats in other vehicles and we continued picking our way through the rocks and multiple stream crossings, passing Black Mountain Hut and reaching Growler Hut for lunch. This hut sports a long-drop loo with a full length picture window giving users a great view of Two Thumb Range.

About half of the group attempted to reach Mistake Flat Hut after lunch. Two heavily modified tough trucks managed to achieve this while the rest of the group stopped to take in the views about halfway there before turning around.

We took a slightly different way back, crossing the Clyde River just upstream of the confluence with the Havelock River and exiting at Erewhon Station. This gave us a much shorter commute back to Methven.

Lawrence River – Hermitage Hut (36km)

Group 2 did this trip on Monday and Group 1 on Tuesday

We woke to a cold and frosty morning. All of the vehicles were iced up overnight. After the morning drivers'briefing, we headed out and drove along the Hakatere Potts Road to Erewhon Station and made our way onto the Clyde River bed, where we aired down. We crossed the Clyde river and made our way upstream on the true right bank. When we stopped to regroup after the deep crossing, our trip leader tripped over a rock when opening the tailgate on his truck. He fell backwards cutting his head open on the fender of a Jeep. The 2IC trip leader took over while Denise and I tended to his wounds. The decision was made for the tough trucks to escort the injured party back to Erewhon station so that they could head back to town to seek medical attention.

Under the guidance of our new trip leader, we set off again. After crossing the Clyde River again we reached the Erewhon Station Hut for a welcome loo stop. The tough trucks had succeeded in their mission and had caught up with the group by taking the shortest route possible. We continued up the Lawrence River reaching the Hermitage Hut for lunch. Everyone was very impressed as Group 2 did not get this far on Monday.

We stopped at Lawrence Hut on our way back, with some vehicles attempting the steep hill climb while others walked up to enjoy the spectacular views of the trucks below and the river valley beyond.

We reached Erewhon station where everyone aired up again while we watched Group 2 making their way across the Clyde river on their way back from Growler Hut.


Everyone returned back to Methven in a very loose convoy. We stopped along the way at Hakatere Historic Station to learn about some of the area's history.






























BOULDER BASH 2023 continued



Rakaia River – Reischek Hut (44km) Group 1 did this trip on Wednesday

This morning found us heading north out of town, turning onto Double Hill Run Road. We stopped at the car park at the end of the road on Glenfalloch Station. After airing down, we followed the power lines and well worn track across the Rakaia River to Manuka Point Lodge. We then turned west and made our way upstream along the true left river bank. The going got very rough as the formed track ran out and the boulders got bigger. We eventually reached Washbourne Hut for lunch after abandoning two vehicles in the riverbed due to damage. Ian's Land Rover had broken a rear shock while a Suzuki Vitara had taken a huge hit on the gearbox cross member and was struggling due to insufficient clearance.

The decision was made that we would turn around after lunch due to the rough conditions. We retraced our tracks, picked up the two limping vehicles and made our way back to Manuka Point. Crossing the Rakaia was a bit more challenging as the river had risen a little during the day due to rain in the area overnight and throughout the day. These were some of the deepest crossings we would face all week. Everyone made it back to town without any further drama.

Harper River - Hamilton Hut (63km)

Group 2 did this trip on Wednesday and Group 1 on Thursday

Thursday morning found us heading north again, up Zigzag road and past Lake Coleridge. Zigzag Road has some of the worst corrugations in the area. We stopped at the Doc Campsite at Glenthorne Station to air down. We then headed out long the canal and into the Harper River valley. The gravel has been shaped in this area to slow the river during flood events and divert the water into Lake Coleridge.

We picked our way upstream, stopping at The Pinnacles for morning tea. This is a similar formation to Putangirua Pinnacles, just on a much smaller scale. We continued making our way upstream until we reached a clearing at the confluence between the Harper River and Hamilton Stream, where we stopped for lunch. Some of the group enjoyed a short hike up to the Hamilton Hut, from all accounts, a really flash hut used by hikers on the Te Araroa Trail.

We then made our way back downstream, taking a short detour up the Corner Creek track. This is a steep hill climb which proved quite challenging in the slippery conditions. Only 3 trucks made it to the top of the hill.

We then made our way back to the canals, checking out the intake on the Wilberforce River. The Harper river has been completely diverted away from the Wilberforce and some of the flow from the Wilberforce River has also been diverted into Lake Coleridge, which feeds a hydroelectric powerstation at the southern end of the lake. Everyone then headed back to Methven for the night.

Selwyn River – Mid Canterbury 4WD Park

Group 2 did this trip on Thursday (Denise & I did not do this trip)

This park was established in conjunction with ECAN to provide a suitable area for 4WD owners to bring their vehicle and have fun, thereby keeping the vehicles out of the nesting areas in the riverbed.

Avoca River – Basins Hut (54km)

Both groups did this trip together on Friday.

The start of the trip was a repeat of the start of the trip up the Harper River. It was just a little more challenging today as there were over 40 trucks in the convoy. We turned left when we reached the confluence with the Avoca River. We then crossed the Avoca River and continued up the true left bank until we passed Triangle Hut. At this point, we crossed the river to the true right bank and continued to Basins Hut, where we stopped for lunch. The awning on Max provided some much needed shelter from the rain. This gave a great opportunity to make new friends.

About half of the group decided to continue upstream after lunch while the rest headed back. We crossed Basins Creek, drove past the Old Basins Hut before crossing the Avoca River again. We weaved our way up the river bank crossing Ampitheatre Creek and Galilee Creek, at which point we turned around.

We made our way back downstream retracing our steps. Quite a few drivers elected not to air up at Glenthorne Station, but to air up after crossing Rakaia Bridge due to the severe corrugations on Zigzag road.

Conclusion

This was a great week of trips hosted by Mid Canterbury 4WD Club. The scenery is just amazing providing spectacular views. We will definitely be back and plan on spending several nights camping in the beautiful scenic wilderness.

TRIP CATEGORIES

Cross Country Vehicle Club Wellington Incorporated (CCVC or Club) organises and runs 4WD trips and events that cover terrain of various degrees of difficulty. Club members and visitors that participate have differing levels of off-road driving skills and experience and their vehicles have differing degrees of off-road capability.

As a guide to participants, the level of difficulty of each trip is identified in advance as falling into one or more of the pre-defined Trip Categories. The Trip Categories are defined as:

Touring Class Travelling on back country roads accessible to the General Public. Limited "off road" travel may occur but only where appropriate to vehicles on the trip;

Family Shiny Introductory level "off road" trip;

Shiny 4x4 More challenging "off road" trip;

Club 4x4 Specialist vehicles and equipment required, also additional driver skills;

Hard Yakka The most difficult terrain, requiring significant driver and vehicle capability.

Safety issues can arise if drivers have inappropriate skills, experience or vehicle capability for any given trip.

CCVC has defined the guidelines set out in this document, describing driver skills and experience prerequisites for participation in club trips and events in order to optimise safety to the greatest extent possible and practicable.

Membership of CCVC

To become a member of CCVC a driver must attend three (3) trips of either the "Touring Class" or "Family Shiny" category trip.

Once these trips have been completed and the "Application for Membership" submitted, the prospective new member's application will be considered through the Club's new member approval process.

Advancing through the trip categories

In order to advance to a "harder" trip category, members are expected to have participated in a minimum of two (2) trips in the previous category. Members are to advise the Trip Leader when they attend their first trip of the next category up.

Members will be required to have attended a club training event, as determined by the Club from time to time, prior to being able to participate in any trip with a category of "Shiny 4x4" or above.

The member must also be judged as being capable to participate in this level of trip by the Trip Leader.

A Trip Leader has the absolute right to exclude a member from a trip if the they believe that the trip is beyond the capability of either the member and/or their vehicle and that participation in the trip has the potential to place the member, their vehicle or other persons participating in the trip in any form of danger due to the Member and/or their vehicles unsuitability.

The Trip Leaders decision on the day is final and can only be contested via the clubs "Complaints Process" as set out in item 51 of the Clubs Rules (Constitution).

To participate in any trip other than "Touring Class" members vehicles must have a current CCVC Vehicle inspection sticker.

Note: Exemption to the Inspection Sticker rule above may be given for trips where the nature of the trip involves minimal or no off road driving and a CCVC certified vehicle is not really required in order to participate in the trip (e.g. Trips/events that have been given a "Shiny 4x4" category in order to exclude non members).

WANT TO PLAY A BIGGER PART IN THE CLUB?

Think of joining the committee or training to become a trip leader. If you think you would like to have a more of a role in the club speak to one of the committee members to see how you can help.







TRAINING:

Training takes place on every trip and Trip Leaders will try to provide support and instruction (as appropriate) to prospective and new members attending each trip.

This may be done either by the trip leader or by having an experienced Club Member take the individual "under their wing" (so to speak) for the period of the trip.

Training events for specific aspects of 4WD'ing will be organised by the Club from time to time.

As from the effective date of this document, attendance at a Club driver training event will no longer be a prerequisite to joining the club.

Members will be required to have attended a Club training event, as determined by the Club from time to time, prior to being able to participate in any trip with a category of "Shiny 4x4" or above.

VEHICLE INSPECTIONS

Safety is paramount in everything the club does and to this end the Club has a vehicle inspection regime where members vehicles are inspected by appointed CCVC Vehicle Inspectors to ensure that the vehicles meet the specific requirements as set out in the various Club documents (e.g. CCVC-SAFETY-0002 Minimum Standards for Tow Hook Mounting).

A vehicle inspection sticker is valid for two (2) years from the date of issue. CCVC requires that all CCVC Members vehicles participating in any trip category other than Touring Class trips have a current CCVC Vehicle Inspection sticker. Members vehicles not having a current sticker displayed cannot participate in trips/events.

The Trip Leader/Event Organiser has no discretion in this regard except: Exemption to the Inspection Sticker rule above may be given for trips where the nature of the trip involves minimal or no off road driving and a CCVC certified vehicle is not really required in order to participate in the trip (e.g. Trips/events that have been given a "Shiny 4x4" category in order to exclude non members).

As from the effective date of this document, having a vehicle inspected and obtaining a vehicle inspection sticker for the vehicle will no longer be a prerequisite to joining the Club. Members and prospective members can judge for themselves which trips are appropriate for them however the Trip Leader has the final say as to whether a person or vehicle can participate in any trip or event.

It is recommended that novices on Family Shiny trips and Members new to the Shiny 4x4 category make themselves known to the Trip Leader so they can be allocated a "buddy" to guide and assist them during the trip.
